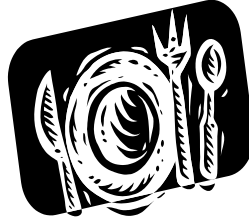

Whole school weekly attendance 93.6%

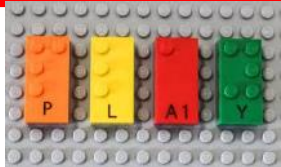

SKIN SAFETY



Sun Protection

At Skelton we acknowledge the importance of sun protection and want staff and pupils to enjoy the sun safely. We will work with staff, pupils and parents and have adopted the teaching tool **Slip! Slop! Slap! Seek! Slide!**

1. Slip on Sun protective clothing.
2. Slop on factor 30 or higher.
3. Slap on a hat that provides shade.
4. Seek shade.
5. Slide on sun glasses.

PROTECTION FROM THE SUN OUTDOORS AT SCHOOL

Shade

- When the sun is strong, we will encourage pupils to sit/play in the shade where it is available.
- Where possible, outdoor activities will take place in the shade.
- In the summer months we will limit time children spend outdoors in direct sunlight.

Clothing

- When outside in sunny weather, pupils are encouraged to wear hats that cover the ears, face and neck.
- Pupils will be encouraged to wear tops that cover their shoulders.
- Pupils are allowed to wear UV protective sunglasses.
- Staff will be encouraged to wear suitable hats and clothing when on playground duty and teaching outdoors on sunny days to reinforce the Slip! Slop! Slap! Seek! Slide! message.

Sunscreen

- Parents are asked to apply sunscreen to pupils before they come to school when the sun is strong during the summer months.
- Pupils will be asked to bring in their own labelled bottle of sunscreen.
- Sunscreen use will be encouraged on days when the sun is strong during summer at lunch breaks, during PE lessons and on school trips.
- We will ask remind children to re-apply sunscreen when necessary.

PROTECTION FROM THE SUN INDOORS AT SCHOOL

- Windows and other ventilation openings will be opened during the cool of early morning to allow stored heat to escape from the building.
- Blinds will be closed and windows open to ensure a ventilate room with children out of direct sunlight.

AT HOME PLEASE CAN YOU

1. Talking to your child about the importance of sun protection at home.
2. Sending your child to school with a (labelled) hat.
3. Sending your child to school with their own (labelled) bottle of sunscreen.
4. Sending your child to school with fresh water daily.



PARLIAMENT NEWS
